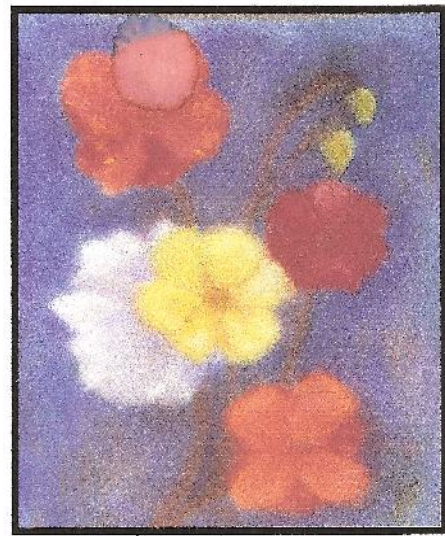

Personal Narratives

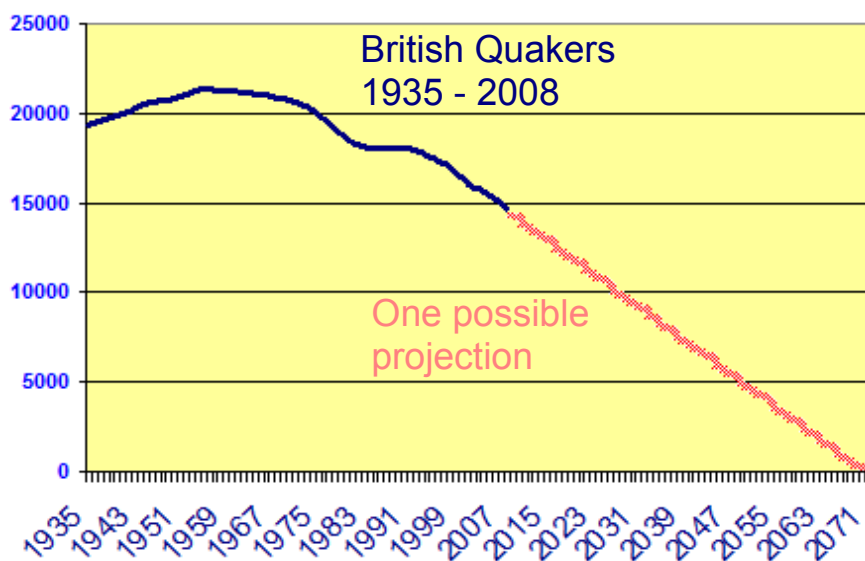
Graham Lawton had a story to tell. Graham, an Attender at Rawdon Meeting, is a Police Officer. Two years ago, as part of his job, he had to close down a house used to sell 'crack'. This resulted in a family with 5 children, two of whom were handicapped, being rendered homeless, with all the attendant problems that brings. Graham persistently raised his concerns and eventually a new and better system was put in place.

Telling his story had been his key to getting things changed, as he explained to Friends at Carlton Hill Meeting. Now Friends have our turn to help change the criminal justice system by telling our stories. The Crime, Community and Justice Group* (CCJG) has launched a campaign to find out exactly how sentencing – be it imprisonment or community service, has affected the perpetrator, their family, friends, community; similarly for the victim, for the sentencer, for anyone who has been affected in any way by the repercussions of a sentence. This might be emotional, physical, financial, job, life-style, any manner of means. By collecting these Personal Narratives the CCJG will accumulate enough stories to give them a view of the reality of sentencing. This they will be able to utilise in their approach to Government consultations and in supporting the work of those campaigning for change.

If you know of anyone, not necessarily a Quaker, affected by sentencing (including any positive responses) and would be willing to participate by 'collecting' that story then please either contact the CCJG administrator Paula Harvey on paulah@quaker.org.uk (02076631036) who will send you the requisite booklet or contact Phil O'Hare philomena.ohare@btinternet.com for more details. All the information will be treated with the utmost confidentiality; the story teller will remain anonymous and identifying particulars will be changed if the stories are published in any form.

* The Crime, Community and Justice Group is a national Quaker organisation of about eight people representing a variety of aspects of the Criminal Justice System. Their remit is to seek ways of making the system more humane.
